

The Scottish Parliament

- The Impetus for Devolution
- Powers
 - Primary and secondary legislative power over 'domestic policies' (agriculture, education, law, health, police, etc.)
 - Limited tax-raising power (3p/£)
 - Block grant from London
 - Reserved powers (to Westminster)

The Scottish Parliament

- Structure
 - 129 Members of the Scottish Parliament (MSPs)
 - 73 in single member districts; 56 by PR in by region
 - Elections every four years (last in 2011)
 - Labour-led coalitions at first
 - Currently SNP government under First Minister
 Alex Salmond →






Welsh National Assembly

- (Limited) sources of Welsh nationalism
 - Plaid Cymru Party of Wales
- Powers
 - Secondary legislative powers only
 - No tax raising authority
 - Block grant from London
- Structure
 - 60 Assembly Members (AMs); 40 from single member districts, 20 by PR
 - Elections every four years (last in 2011)
 - Minority Labour government under First Minister Carwyn Jones




Welsh flag


Language and Elections

Northern Ireland Assembly

- Early devolution, The Troubles, and direct rule
 - Protestant/Unionist versus Catholic/Republicans
 - NOT really a religious conflict; more political/national
- The peace process
- The Good Friday Agreement (1998)
 - Devolution
 - Consociationalism
 - Cross-border and intergovernmental cooperation

The Northern Ireland Assembly

- Assembly
 - 108 members, elected via single transferable vote
 - Must declare allegiance (unionist, republican, or other)
- First Minister and Deputy First Minister (from opposite camps)
- Ministers shared proportionally

 - Ulster Unionist Party (UUP)
 - Democratic Unionist Party (DUP)
- REPUBLICAN
 - Social Democratic and Labour Party (SDLP)
