Tips For Calling

Telephone calls are a great way for students and parents to have contact with Rose-Hulman. Since it comes from someone not directly associated with campus, your call can have a major impact. You will be viewed as having a less vested interest in their decision. Therefore, you will be more likely to “tell it like it is”. Here are a few tips to follow when calling prospective students and parents.

- Identify your self as a graduate of Rose-Hulman.
- Talk with the parent if the student is not available.
- Stress the fact that you are a local contact and available as a resource.
- Be a positive advocate for Rose-Hulman. Do not disparage or be negative about other schools. Feel free to share your own personal experiences.
- Encourage a campus visit, if they have not already done so.
- Try not to impose on their time with a long conversation unless it appears that the student or parent wishes for the conversation to go on.
- Thank them for their time and interest.
- Make notes of the conversation.

Follow up

Please try and make the call(s) within two weeks of receiving the list from the Office of Admissions. Upon completion of your call(s), forward by e-mail or U.S. mail a report of the conversation(s) to the Office of Admissions. Be sure to include any specific questions which may have arisen so that we may respond with the appropriate information. Your report will be used for future tracking purposes and as a gauge of a student’s interest in Rose-Hulman.

College Fairs

College fair participation is a very important part of the Rose-Hulman admissions effort. Through your contacts our mailing list grows, increasing the applicant pool and making Rose-Hulman a better place.

Guidelines for attending a college fair:

- Business attire is expected - not business casual.
- Arrive about 30 minutes before the program begins.
- Check in with the high school hosts and go to the Rose-Hulman table. Most college fairs will be arranged in alphabetical order.
- Arrange the table with your materials in a pleasing manner.
- Be sure to have every student you talk to fill out a contact card.
- Be a positive advocate for Rose-Hulman. Refrain from putting down other schools.
- Stand behind the table and show by your manner that you are ready and eager to answer questions about Rose-Hulman. Do not wander out into the aisle and “buttonhole” students and families.
- Do not distribute items other than what is provided by the Admissions Office. Refrain from distributing candy, pencils, etc.
- There will be some fairs where you will not talk with large numbers of students and parents. Worry about quality, not quantity.
- This is a serious process - one with \$160,000 repercussion. Take it seriously. At the same time, have fun. Feel free to use your own experiences to illustrate your points.
- If you are unable to attend, you are responsible for finding a replacement. *Nothing is worse than an empty table with our name on it.*

Follow up

After the fair, mail all contact cards to the Admissions Office as quickly as possible. The sooner we receive them, the sooner we can begin recruiting the student.

Interviews

From time to time, you may be called upon to interview a prospective student for Rose-Hulman. This is a way for the Office of Admissions to assess a student from a different perspective.

The purpose of the interview is to get to know the student and help the student learn more about Rose-Hulman. Variables that could be assessed include a student's motivational level, personality traits, their ability to work and communicate with other people, your personal assessment of the student and, finally, their enthusiasm for Rose-Hulman.

Do not feel that the interview will “make or break” a student's opportunities at Rose-Hulman. Many factors go into an admissions decision and the interview is simply a part of the mosaic that the Office of Admissions takes into consideration.

Here are some guidelines for conducting an interview:

- Allow students to talk about themselves initially as a way of putting them at ease. Ask about hobbies, family, school activities, interest in a career in engineering and science, etc.
- Ask about accomplishments of which they are particularly proud
- Ask about career aspirations
- Ask why they would like to attend Rose-Hulman
- Ask about activities where they have had to work with other people
- Ask if they have any questions of you as a Rose-Hulman alum

Follow up

Immediately after interviewing the student, please write a short summary of the meeting including a student's interest in Rose-Hulman, their ability to be successful, their ability to contribute to campus and your overall view of the student as a prospective student and alum of Rose-Hulman. Forward this information to the Office of Admissions as soon as possible.

Quick Reference Guide

This reference guide is for your use in answering questions of prospective students and parents. Subjects are listed alphabetically on the RIGHT hand margin for easier search. If you are unable to find the answer to a specific question, refer the student or parent to the Office of Admissions, 1-800-248-7448.

Academic Calendar

Rose-Hulman is on a 10 week quarter system. There is a Fall, Winter and Spring Quarter. Classes begin around Labor Day and end around Memorial Day. Some schools call this a tri-semester system. A summer session is held with a limited offering of classes.

Accreditation

All engineering programs at Rose-Hulman are fully accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET). In addition, the school is accredited by the North Central Association and the Department of Public Instruction for the state of Indiana. The Chemistry program has also been approved by the American Chemical Society.

Admission Criteria

Many factors go into making an admissions decision. The following criteria are only part of the process. Because of this, **never guarantee admission to any student**. Always encourage students to apply.

The following are **minimum academic requirements** for admission to Rose-Hulman:

Advance Placement (AP)

In general, Rose-Hulman awards advanced placement credit for scores of 4 or 5 on the College Board's AP examination. Credit is awarded in Physics only if the exam is the "C" or calculus-based exam.

Also, credit is awarded for completion of the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Credit is awarded for scores of 5 or higher on the Higher Level (HL) examinations.

Applying to Rose-Hulman

Rose-Hulman receives over 3000 applications for freshman admission each year. Admission is very competitive. The following are the steps towards admission:

- Students may apply for freshman admission after their junior year in high school is complete.
- Applications are reviewed on a rolling basis until the freshman class is full. This means that the Office of Admissions will review applications on a continuous basis until March 1.
- Rose-Hulman does not have an early decision program
- Students should complete the student portion of the application, ask the counselor to complete Part C and ask for teacher or counselor recommendations.
- An admissions decision will typically be made within three weeks after the Office of Admissions receives all parts of the application.
- Once a student is admitted, he/she has until May 1 to make a final college selection decision.
- An enrollment deposit of \$100 is required by May 1 to guarantee a student's place in the freshman class.

Athletics and Recreation

There is an extraordinary variety of athletic and recreational opportunities on campus. The Sports and Recreation Center offers an eight lane pool and diving well and a field house with a 200 meter indoor track, four basketball/volleyball courts, one tennis court, weight room, two racquetball courts, aerobics room, stationary exercise equipment; and a competition arena that seats 1800. Also, there are six lighted outdoor tennis courts and a lighted intramural complex that holds three softball fields that can be converted to one and a half football practice fields and one soccer field. Rose-Hulman is the training camp home for the NFL Indianapolis Colts.

Other facilities include Cook Stadium and Phil Brown Field for football and outdoor track, Jim Rendel Field for soccer, Art Nehf Field for baseball and a softball field. All of these competition fields have lights except for Rendel Field.

Rose-Hulman is a member of the NCAA Division III. By definition, no athletic grants-in-aid are awarded. Rose-Hulman is currently a member of the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference. The other eight members of the HCAC are:

Campus Visits

Campus visits are definitely encouraged. Due to the large volume of visitors, we ask that students visit sometime after April 1 of their junior year of high school. Each visit is designed around an individual's interests. Because of this, it is not unusual for a visit to last 3-4 hours. We strongly suggest that a student and family make a reservation before coming to campus. Daily appointments are taken at 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. A campus visit could include any or all of the following:

- Interview with an admissions office staff member
- Campus tour
- Meeting with an academic department representative
- Attend a freshman level class
- Discussion and explanation of Rose-Hulman financial aid programs
- Meeting with coaches

Overnight stays in the residence halls can also be arranged for seniors who have applied. An appointment would need to be arranged two weeks in advance for this option.

Large group visitation days are scheduled about once a month. Dates and times are announced through the mail and web site on a regular basis.

Career Services

Rose-Hulman has one of the best career placement records in the nation. For 30 years, Rose-Hulman has maintained a placement rate of 99-100% within six months of graduation. The Career Services Office in the Student Union houses five interview rooms, a library of over 500 company profiles and job search tools and resources provided free of charge.

- Career counseling begins the freshman year
- Over 250 companies annually visit campus for interview purposes
- The yearly career fair attracts over 170 companies
- The average starting salary for a 2006 graduate was \$54,000
- There is a robust co-op and internship program. Currently, over 90% of graduating seniors will have had a co-op or internship
- Approximately 15-20% of graduates immediately attend graduate school

Cars

Freshmen are allowed to have a vehicle on campus and may park in any student lot. There is ample parking available and there is no charge for parking privileges.

Computers

There are numerous specialty computer labs on campus in addition to the laptop computer requirement. Over 50 classrooms and laboratories have laptop network connections. When comparing this cost to other schools, it is important to remember that it includes the laptop computer and book estimates. All costs have been estimated with the exception of travel. Chemical Engineering and Chemistry majors have an additional \$200 software cost in the freshman year.

Enrollment Deposit

After a student is admitted, he/she has until May 1 of their senior year to make a final commitment for college. This is a national date to which all colleges and universities are expected to adhere. A student becomes an official member of the freshman class by submitting a \$100 enrollment deposit. The deposit has no bearing on financial aid or housing. The deposit is non-refundable.

Faculty to Student Ratio

The faculty to student ratio is 1:12.

Financial Aid

Rose-Hulman makes every attempt to make our education affordable. There are two types of financial aid: Need-based and Merit-based. A student may qualify for both, depending upon his/her academic background and the family financial situation.

The filing of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the only financial aid form necessary for Rose-Hulman students to complete. This one form will determine a student's eligibilities for federal, state and Rose-Hulman aid based on the financial situation of the family. The FAFSA can be filed after January 1 and before March 1 of the senior year of high school.

Refer specific questions about financial aid to the Office of Admissions and the Office of Financial Aid. DO NOT RELY UPON YOUR EXPERIENCE. THIS AREA CHANGES FREQUENTLY AND INFORMATION CAN QUICKLY BECOME OUT OF DATE.

Food Service

An 18 meal plan is provided as part of room and board. A broad selection of food is available at each meal with unlimited "seconds". Vegetarian and religious dietary requirements can also be accommodated. In addition to the main dining hall, there is the Worx snack bar and Subway sandwich shop on campus.

Graduation Rates

Persistence of Rose-Hulman students is much higher than the national norm. Nationally, only 45% of freshman engineering students graduate from an engineering program.

At Rose-Hulman, nearly 95% of freshmen return for the sophomore year and over 80% of incoming students graduate from Rose-Hulman. Also, nearly 90% of Rose-Hulman graduates do so in 4 academic years.

Health Services

Rose-Hulman maintains a limited health care service for students. Five mornings a week, a nurse and doctor are on duty. Ordinarily, medicine is distributed free, but certain services such as x-rays, laboratory tests and special prescription drugs are not available on campus. A medical form is required to be on file for all students. In addition, two regional hospitals are located in Terre Haute.

Counseling services are also available at the health service office. Professional counselors are available for students to talk with.

Humanities

Rose-Hulman offers a rich and diverse course offering in the humanities and social sciences. Over 150 courses are available with 15 minors offered. Rose-Hulman actually requires more humanities courses for graduation than is needed for ABET accreditation. The Rose-Hulman graduation requirement also dictates that the courses be across a broad spectrum of course offerings. Also, students may cross-register at Indiana State University or St. Mary-of-the-Woods College.

Laptop Computers

Every student at Rose-Hulman is required to purchase through the college an approved computer. It may be done through a 4 year lease-to-own program or through outright purchase. Included in the purchase is:

- A software suite valued at more than \$3000
- Free upgrades on all supplied software for as long as they are students at Rose-Hulman
- A four year warranty
- An insurance policy
- Repair services provided by Rose-Hulman
- Loaner units, should a student's machine need repair

Library

The Logan Library on the Rose-Hulman campus is home to over 60,000 volumes and over 200 subscription publications. Also available are extensive selections of CD-ROM reference materials as well as on-line search vehicles.

The Logan Library is primarily a science and engineering resource center. For other needs, students use additional local resources. Rose-Hulman participates in a consortium arrangement with Indiana State University and St. Mary-of-the-Woods College. Electronic catalogs give students information about the 1,250,000 holdings of the three libraries. Rose-Hulman students have lending privileges at the other facilities as if they were students on that campus. Also, an extensive interlibrary loan program is in place.

Music and the Fine Arts

There are numerous musical and fine arts outlets for the Rose-Hulman student. Three bands are available - Jazz, Pep and Concert. Also, the Rose-Hulman Chorus is made up of individuals with vocal talents. Finally, the Drama Club performs three times a year under the direction of a professional director. Hatfield Hall, Rose-Hulman's new performing arts center and auditorium, opened in 2003.

The annual Engineers In Concert program is an opportunity for members of the Rose-Hulman community to showcase their musical talents. This event is one of the eight or nine performances that make up the Fine Arts Series, which is free.

Pre-Professional Programs

Engineering is not "pre" anything. However, it can be excellent preparation for future studies in medicine, business and law. Large numbers of Rose-Hulman graduates pursue advanced degrees in areas other than engineering and science.

Pre-Medicine

Over the last 20 years, Rose-Hulman has had a 90% admission rate to medical school. A little known statistic is that medical schools admit engineering students at a higher rate than the more traditional sciences.

Pre-Law

Rose-Hulman has numerous alumni who are attorneys specializing in patent, intellectual or environmental law.

MBA

The most popular non-engineering or science advanced degree pursued by Rose-Hulman graduates is the MBA.

Residential Life

Freshmen are required to live on campus. There are nine residence halls on campus housing approximately 900 students. Each room is equipped with the following:

- Computer network connection for each resident
- Cable TV connection for local basic service
- Telephone
- Beds, wardrobes, desks and chairs for each student
- All resident hall rooms are carpeted

Each floor in the freshman halls is staffed with a resident assistant (RA) and two Sophomore Advisors (SA). The RA is a junior or senior and has duties that include counseling, rule enforcement, and community building. The SA is there to help freshmen with adjustment to campus life and to serve as academic tutors.

ROTC

Both Army and Air Force ROTC programs are available at Rose-Hulman. Different types of scholarships are offered by these programs. Typically, the scholarships will cover \$5000 to full tuition, books, and pay a stipend of \$150 per month. Application needs to be made before November 15 of the senior year in high school. Applications can be requested from the ROTC offices at Rose-Hulman.

Rose-Hulman Ventures

Rose-Hulman Ventures was established through the generosity of the Lilly Foundation in 2000. The gift, \$29.7 million, provided funds for a business incubator and business tech support center. Located 3 miles south of the campus on IN 46, it provides space for start-ups and established companies alike. During the summer of 2005, 85 Rose-Hulman students worked at RHV on a broad variety of projects. There will continue to be excellent employment and internship opportunities through RHV.

Security

Rose-Hulman's campus is an extremely safe one. Despite this, all students are encouraged to use caution and common sense when traveling on campus. No violent crime has been reported on campus in the history of the school. A security force is on duty 24 hours a day for student assistance. Also, Rose-Hulman is within the limits of Terre Haute and is also covered by the city police and fire departments.

Summer Programs

Rose-Hulman offers a summer program for after the **junior** year of high school called Operation Catapult. This three week program is designed as a group oriented, hands on opportunity for students to learn more about engineering and science. Transfer Credit

In general, if a student takes an accredited college course comparable to a Rose-Hulman course and receives a grade of "C" or higher, credit will be awarded.
