Milestone 2—Project Identification

This milestone is to be completed as a team.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this milestone are two-fold. The first objective is for you to identify the language that your team will use for its final project. The second objective is for you to identify several possible projects that you might complete for your term project.

REQUIREMENTS

You have three tasks for this milestone:

- Identify your team name. Your team name must be valid as a subversion repository name. Witty team names are preferred but not required. You might find this site useful: http://www.savware.net/sw/nG/ Email me your team name as soon as you have agreed on it, but no later than the milestone due date. Please be sure to include your team name in all future project-related correspondence.
- 2. Identify the language that your team wishes to use for the project. Again, email this to me as soon as you have agreed on it, but no later than the milestone due date. My plan is that only one team in each section may use any particular language and that languages will be assigned on a first-come basis. I may make adjustments to this plan if needed.
- 3. Prepare a document, with a section for each bullet point below, identifying possible projects that your team could work on. Although you may already have a project in mind, I'd like you to use the process below to spark your creativity. Try to have fun with this!
 - *Team information*.: Be sure to include your team name, team members, and chosen language in your document.
 - Brainstorm project ideas: As a team, list 30 different project ideas. You'll have to be a bit crazy to do this. Remember the number one rule of brainstorming: no squashing. Just come up with 30 different ideas. Don't worry about their practicality at this stage. Here are some prompts: What's a ridiculously large project? What's a project that has the potential to improve society? What's a project that has the potential to improve your checking account balance? What's a project that you'd like to use?
 - Brainstorm selection criteria: As a team, list 15 different criteria that you might use to evaluate project ideas. A couple of examples are "appropriate scope" and "interesting to everyone on team".
 - *Identify the most important criteria*: Identify the 5 most important criteria from your list of fifteen. Weight each of these criteria by distributing 10 points between them. For example, if you think they are all equally important, you could make each of the five be worth 2 points. If you think that one criterion is very important and the others much less so, you could make that one worth 6 points, and the others worth 1 point each.

- *Identify top project ideas*: From your list of 30 project ideas, pick 5 that you want to evaluate. Expand on these 5 by writing a couple of sentences describing each.
- Rate projects: Create a table, like the one below, that lists your 5 chosen projects down the left and your 5 most important criteria across the top. For each criterion, rank your projects from 1 to 5, with a 5 going to the project that best meets the criterion and 1 to the worst. This is a ranking, so no ties are allowed. Calculate a weighted score for each project based on the weights of the individual criteria as shown in the example.

• Expand on top two ideas: Select your top two project ideas based on this rating. (You should feel free to iterate on the weighting process if your "gut feel" tells you that the projects that scored the most points aren't really ones that you would want to do.) Write a brief description for each of your top two ideas, including the scope of the project, why your team is interested in working on it, why you think it is an appropriate project for the course, and what you think the biggest risk is for the project.
