```
public class RightTriangle {  
  
    private double height;  
    private double width;  
  
    public RightTriangle() {  
        this.height = 1.0;  
        this.width = 1.0;  
    }  
  
    public RightTriangle(double height, double width) {  
        this.height = height;  
        this.width = width;  
    }  
  
    public RightTriangle getScaledTriangle(double scale) {  
        double newHeight = height * scale;  
        double newWidth = width * scale;  
  
        return new RightTriangle(newHeight, newWidth);  
    }  
  
    public String toString() {  
        double aSquared = this.height * this.height;  
        double bSquared = this.width * this.width;  
        double c = Math.sqrt(aSquared + bSquared);  
        return String.format("A = %.2f, B = %.2f, C = %.2f",  
            this.height, this.width, c);  
    }  
}
```

1. (9 points) Below are several code snippets that use the RightTriangle class. For each snippet, first *draw a box-and-pointer diagram* showing the result of executing it. Then *give the output* of the print statement at the end of the snippet. DO NOT TYPE THE CODE SNIPPETS FOR THIS QUESTION IN ECLIPSE.

```
RightTriangle newTriangle = new RightTriangle();  
System.out.println(newTriangle.toString());
```

rt1 = rt2.getScaledTriangle(3.0);

System.out.println((degCelsius * 9 ) / 5 + 32);
```

for (int i = 0; i <= maxFrequency; i++) {
    // loop body excluded
}
```

4. (6 points) Write T next to the statements that are true, F next to the statements that are false.

\_\_\_\_\_ Static methods use no instance variables of any object of the class they are defined in.

\_\_\_\_\_ If I had a class Foo with a non-static method nonstatic(), I could call it like this: Foo.nonstatic();.

\_\_\_\_\_ Before you can call a static method, you must first create an instance of a class like this: MyClass foo = new MyClass();.

\_\_\_\_\_ Static methods typically take all their data from parameters and compute something from those parameters.

\_\_\_\_\_ If i and j are int values, then Math.max(i,j) is an example of a correct way to call a static method.

\_\_\_\_\_ A static variable is shared by all instances of a class, so a change to it from any instance affects all other instances.
